TEACHERS GUIDE

BATTLEFIELD EXPLORATION AND DESIGN AN EXHIBIT

THEME:

A variety of people including soldiers, civilians and slaves experienced the Battle of Fredericksburg. Each person viewed and interpreted that experience differently. Importantly, every individual had to make important decisions over the course of time before, during, and after the battle. An investigation of these varied experiences and choices yields a more comprehensive understanding of the experience not only of the Battle of Fredericksburg, but also the collective lived experience of the American Civil War.

OVERVIEW:

Not Your Average Walking Tour

This program seeks to engage students with the resources available at the Fredericksburg Battlefield to help them better understand the Civil War experience. Students will accompany a Park Ranger on a battlefield exploration, investigating historic sites and structures to learn about the experience of soldiers, civilians, and slaves throughout the war. After exploring the Fredericksburg Battlefield and Fredericksburg National Cemetery, students will have the opportunity to examine reproduction artifacts. During this activity students will decide how they would tell and represent the stories they have learned about by creating their own mini exhibit for the Visitor Center.

GOALS:

- To provide students with an engaging, interactive educational experience
- To help students explore the varied experience of soldiers, civilians, and slaves during the Battle of Fredericksburg
- To investigate what these experiences at Fredericksburg can tell us about the national experience of Civil War
- To foster an understanding for the ways in which the Civil War is still relevant to and impacts our country today
- To encourage students to take ownership of their National Park and the history of their nation commemorated here

OBJECTIVES:

AT THE END OF THE PROGRAM STUDENTS WILL BE ABLE TO:

- Reflect on and synthesize what they have learned and present it to their class
- Remember important narratives and themes related to the Battle of Fredericksburg and the Civil War

- Identify significant places and spaces on the Fredericksburg Battlefield
- Understand, to a degree, the experience of and choices made by soldiers, civilians and slaves during the Battle of Fredericksburg

DISTANCE The Battlefield Exploration will cover approximately one half mile of

ground. Walkways are both paved and gravel.
